## Rebellion takes root on Waiheke

Members of Extinction Rebellion Waiheke joined forces to plant 21 põhutukawa alongside 30 native grasses on Saturday. Dog walkers Brad Roebuck-Ward and Chris Hammond stopped to help out as the group planted trees at Owhanake Reserve and on council land bordering the urupā on Tui Road.

"The trees will help with coastal erosion in these low-lying areas that are prone to storm damage, they provide us with oxygen, and they're home for native birds," says Robyn Bailey, one of Extinction Rebellion Waiheke's founding members.

"It's lovely that members of the public stopped to help - this is an issue that affects all of us."

Extinction Rebellion Waiheke (XRW) launched in June as part of an international movement which began in London to encourage peaceful local action in light of climate change.

"We've got 10 years to get our act together to limit temperature rise," says Susan Barker, a local gardener who sourced the trees and gained council approval to plant them.

"After that, we'll start seeing massive social and environmental effects, such as crop failure due to extreme weather, insurance compa-

nies refusing to insure coastal properties due to sea-level rise and storm damage, and unprecedented loss of animal, plant

and ultimately human life. The point of this planting is that we, as individuals, must all radically and immediately reduce our emissions and create more opportunities for carbon absorption."
