

Project Forever Waiheke (PFW) feedback on the Draft Waiheke Local Board Plan 2023

Kia ora Local Board members

We thank you for the work that has gone into this thoughtful and comprehensive draft Plan. In providing our feedback, PFW acknowledges that the Local Board has taken into account and attempted to balance the needs, wishes and hopes of diverse resident interests, and also that the Board is constrained in the scope of what it can do by the reality of the current Council fiscal context.

Suggested changes and additions

PFW would appreciate that the suggested revisions and additions, set out in *Table 1* (p 3), be included in the final version of the Local Board Plan 2023. In our perception, the Board's Draft focuses on good intentions, but in many aspects needs to have a stronger component of clear actions by the Local Board.

Our requested revisions are all related to issues for Waiheke's development that residents have attributed, in PFW's research projects, to overtourism impacts on Waiheke social and natural environments.

Each of our suggested amendments is intended, and phrased, to supplement the existing phrasing in the Draft Local Board Plan. Where relevant, we have included recommendations from the Draft Waiheke Destination Management Plan (as included in the May 2023 Local Board meeting agenda).

For convenience and simplicity, we've provided suggested changes to the actual text of the Draft Plan, to reflect what we view as important omissions in the Draft. We believe that the suggested amendments are self-explanatory in most cases, but we've included explanatory notes for some points before the summary of requested changes. We're also very happy to provide clarification if the Board wishes.

Please note our specific request, that the phrasing relating to the feasibility study on priority domestic water supply (#10) be changed to accurately reflect what was agreed at the May 2023 Local Board Business Meeting.

Thank you for this opportunity to contribute to the value of the Waiheke Local Board Plan 2023.

Explanatory notes

General • comments re all suggested amendments in Table 1

- The Draft Plan has a strong focus in 'supporting' and 'advocating' for both improvements to, and mitigation of damage to, Waiheke, but it doesn't sufficiently describe how the Board will *instigate and implement* actions for actual change, albeit in collaboration with community groups.
- References in the current Draft Plan to 'protection', 'restoration' and 'regeneration' commonly refer only to the natural environment, and ignore the critical needs of the community and social environment. We have extended those references, where relevant, to include social/community environments, in recognition that *residents are the kaitiaki* essential to Waiheke's natural environments, and as such equally need protection.
- The Draft Plan doesn't sufficiently reflect the damage that overtourism and related impacts have *already* caused to the Waiheke community and to the sustainability of the spirit of the community, which have been eroded by the loss of many of the island's most valuable kaitiaki, due variously to the housing crisis, ferry access, costs and unreliability, road congestion, and overwhelming tourist numbers negatively impacting residents' access to our recreational spaces.
- ## 1-2, & 15- The Draft Plan uses the term 'regenerative tourism', but currently none of the intended *actions* outlined in the Plan support regeneration, and few support even the sustainability of the present damage from tourism to the Waiheke community and natural environments.
- ## 9-12, & 16 Residents' access to services that needs protecting does not reflect a 'lifestyle' choice; it reflects a basic need for, and right to, equitable priority access (by virtue of being residents) to essential services which are disrupted by overtourism, denying residents timely essential services.
- "Compatible' needs to be defined."Tourism' type needs to be clarified; Waiheke already suffers from an excess of 'small to medium' Airbnb operators, contributing to the now both chronic and critical rental housing crisis.
- ## 15, 20-21, Note that the draft Destination Management Plan (May 2023 LB Meeting & 23

 Agenda) recommends both a visitor levy, and unspecified 'other measures', specifically in order to limit visitor numbers to within sustainable carrying capacity.
- ## 23 The actions in the 'Additional point' in #23 <u>all</u> reflect successfully implemented initiatives in other comparable OECD countries, as set out on pp 42-51 of <u>PFW's 2021 submission to the Destination Management Plan</u>, and in more recent actions in NZ and Australia to increase Council rates on short-stay accommodation.
