## Students take to pickets and planting in bid to prevent Palm Beach erosion

The dunes at Palm Beach have taken a bashing in recent storms, but they got some care and attention recently from local school children.

The year five and six students from Te Huruhi School's room 12 planted spinifex and pingaoa, and then decorated fence palings to protect their plants late last month.

When they returned a couple of days later, however, they feared their hard work had been undone when they saw their palings had disappeared.

"The children were very sad and thought they had been stolen," says Waiheke Resources Trust engagement and projects coordinator Kristin Busher.

In fact, the palings had been picked up by an Auckland Council employee who arranged for them to be secured to posts that have now been dug deeper into the sand and linked with a rope to discourage people from walking over the new plantings.

Palm Beach Coast Care coordinator Margaret Peacocke says that on the planting day, the students made a presentation to the accompanying adults of what they had learned about the plants.

"I was impressed by the students' knowledge of the long-term benefits of planting spinifex and of the importance to the plant's survival of not walking or sitting on them," says Margaret.

The dune planting was part of the Marine Education Initiative project which is funded by the Waiheke Local Board and supported by the Waiheke Resources Trust

and Sustainable Schools, says Kristin.

"Thave been working with the students engaging them with their marine environment, giving opportunities to explore the types of issues our marine environment is facing and then deciding on some direct action they can take here on Waiheke," she says.

"One of the aims is for the students to connect with existing community groups or initiatives and to work alongside them, so connecting with the Palm Beach Coast Care Group's dune-planting programme at Mawhitipana was a perfect fit."

This planting was the first for the 2019 season and, if the plants can get established, they will provide a natural barrier between the sea and the land, reducing the likelihood of major erosion.

Waiheke students will present the work they have done this year as part of the Marine Education Initiative on Friday 16 August at a Waiheke Marine Action Celebration Day.

Students will showcase the actions they have taken through presentations and stalls. The event takes place at Surfdale Hall and starts at 10am. • Erin Johnson
