Testing the waters: Citizen science project

Project Little Oneroa is looking for keen community members to join in a new waterway monitoring project at Onetangi, Mawhitipana Bay (Palm Beach) and Omiha.

The initiative, which is run by the Waiheke Resources Trust, aims to expand water testing beyond Little Oneroa with data collection to understand and monitor the ecological health of Waiheke waterways.

Volunteers will be trained to use the Waicare kit and will test for varying levels of dissolved oxygen, water clarity, water and air temperature, phosphates and nitrates as well as monitor macroinvertebrate populations.

"Waiheke is home to some of New Zealand's endangered or threatened species including the giant kökopu and long finned tuna (eel)," says project coordinator Kirstin Busher.

"Our waterways hold some magnificent creatures but are also where all of our stormwater, and if not functioning correctly, our wastewater run offends up.

Monitoring streams using the Waicare water testing equipment can help to determine how the creatures living in our waterways are faring under the pressures of development.

The Little Oneroa Stream has been monitored using these techniques for the past five years and ecologically the stream is really doing well, according to Kirsten.

She says schools of banded kōkopu and many sensitive species that you wouldn't find in heavily sedimented or polluted waters call the Little Oneroa Stream home.

"It's a really fun activity for all ages and can be taken on by a family or a group of people. It's a way for the community

to connect with their awa their streams and their natural environment."

The Waiheke Resources Trust will hold a training workshop and information morning at Onetangi Hall on Saturday 12th October, Anyone interested can come along and learn more. The morning will end with a Kai Conscious morning tea.
